Deaf Alcoholic Vodcast

For the first time in the history of **Alcoholics Anonymous** Deaf alcoholics can share their stories with other Deaf alcoholics through mass media in American Sign Language.

What is a vodcast? A vodcast, also known as a podcast, is a type of online video content that is basically a podcast with a video element.

The primary purpose of the Deaf Alcoholic Vodcast is to carry the message to "Deaf" alcoholics.

Our vodcast team made three prototype vodcasts and sent them to *Grapevine* to be considered for a Deaf Vodcast playlist on *Grapevine and La Viña* YouTube Channel.

Anonymity: If full-face photographs and other easily identifiable photos or videos of A.A. members are published or broadcast, even though their full names are not given, these are considered anonymity breaks.



For Deaf alcoholics to be able to share their story in American Sign Language, we hire an interpreter to copy-sign their story.

At this time we are not aware of any mass media forum for Deaf alcoholics to share their recovery stories with other Deaf alcoholics in American Sign Language. Historically access committees have hired interpreters and translated the Deaf persons' story into an English audio recording or written English for Grapevine magazine or the Box 459 newsletter.

The funding for the ASL vodcast project is the responsibility of our Deaf Alcoholic Vodcast team. We make the videos and provide them to Grapevine.

With Grapevine's guidance, we have written out guidelines to help AA Access Committees work with the deaf alcoholics and the Deaf Alcoholic Vodcast team to make videos to submit to Grapevine.
